If you are new or visiting ...

Welcome! After the service, please come to Coffee Hour (in the Lounge on the 2nd floor) for food and fellowship. Though other churches make the claim, ours really is the Best Coffee Hour in Connecticut. Please consider filling out a blue visitor information card (located in the pew rack). You can use the form to request a nametag, and next Sunday it will be waiting for you on the table just inside the main church entrance.

To follow along with the service all you need is this service bulletin and *The Hymnal 1982* (the BLUE book located in the pew rack).

Families with small children: Three seating areas at the front of the church are reserved for families with small children: the area under the array of paper cranes (for children age 3 and under), and the areas in front of the two front pews (for children age 10 and under). For safety, every child should be accompanied by a caregiver.

Education for All Ages takes place from 9 to 9:45 A.M. on most Sundays during the academic year.

Wireless access in the Sanctuary is accessible by connecting to wireless network STEC – Guest. Your device will open a web browser and St. Thomas's website. Sunday bulletins are posted on the website's Bulletin Archive. We aim to reduce printing by encouraging worshippers to use their smart devices to follow the order of service.

Restrooms for men and women are located on the second floor. Go through the red double doors at the front of the church, up the stairs to the left, and to the far end of the hallway. An **all-gender restroom (with baby changing table)** is in the Vesting Room, located opposite the red double doors at the front of the church.

All are invited to receive Holy Communion. Baptism is not required; church membership is not required. **Gluten-free bread** is available at each communion station; **non-alcoholic wine** is available from the chalice bearer at the center. Any difference will be explained during the announcements.

To receive Holy Communion hold out your hands, and the server will place bread in them. If you wish to receive wine, please sip it from the common cup, using both hands to guide the chalice to your lips.

ABOUT TODAY'S LITURGY

Today is the last Sunday in Lent and the first day of Holy Week. It is the Sunday at which Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem and Jesus' Passion on the cross are recalled. The observance of Palm Sunday in Jerusalem was witnessed by the pilgrim Egeria around 380. There was a procession down the Mount of Olives into Jerusalem. People waved branches of palms or olive trees as they walked. They sang psalms and shouted, "Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord!" In our 1979 *Book of Common Prayer*, the Liturgy of the Palms is the entrance rite for the service. It includes a reading of one of the gospel accounts of Jesus' entry into Jerusalem. The people receive blessed palm branches, and may process in or around the church. The Liturgy of the Palms is followed by the salutation and the collect of the day. There the service changes focus abruptly from the triumphal entry into Jerusalem to the solemnity of the Passion. The Passion Gospel from Matthew, Mark, or Luke is read. Specific roles may be assigned to different persons; the congregation takes the part of the crowd. Brief silence is observed when the moment of Jesus' death is narrated.

For the five Sundays in Lent (and, as usual, on Easter Day) the congregation will stay in the pews for the Eucharistic prayer. Cushions are available at the back of the church for those who wish to kneel. Our practice of “communion in the round” will return the Sunday after Easter. During Lent we are using *The Hymnal 1982* (the blue book found in the pew racks) for singing the congregational hymns.

THE LITURGY OF THE PALMS

At the direction of the Presider, the People gather for Liturgy of the Palms, which begins with the ringing of a bell.

Presider: Blessed is the King who comes in the name of the Lord:

People: Peace in heaven and glory in the highest.

Presider: Let us pray.

Assist us mercifully with your help, O Lord God of our salvation, that we may enter with joy upon the contemplation of those mighty acts, whereby you have given us life and immortality; through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

THE GOSPEL

LUKE 19:28-40

Deacon: The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke.

People: Glory to you, Lord Christ.

After telling a parable to the crowd at Jericho, Jesus went on ahead, going up to Jerusalem. When he had come near Bethphage and Bethany, at the place called the Mount of Olives, he sent two of the disciples, saying, "Go into the village ahead of you, and as you enter it you will find tied there a colt that has never been ridden. Untie it and bring it here. If anyone asks you, 'Why are you untying it?' just say this, 'The Lord needs it.'" So those who were sent departed and found it as he had told them. As they were untying the colt, its owners asked them, "Why are you untying the colt?" They said, "The Lord needs it." Then they brought it to Jesus; and after throwing their cloaks on the colt, they set Jesus on it. As he rode along, people kept spreading their cloaks on the road. As he was now approaching the path down from the Mount of Olives, the whole multitude of the disciples began to praise God joyfully with a loud voice for all the deeds of power that they had seen, saying,

Blessed be he that cometh in the name of the Lord.

Blessed be the King of Israel that cometh in the name of the Lord.

Peace in heaven and glory in the highest places.

Hosanna in the highest heavens.

The Deacon continues:

Some of the Pharisees in the crowd said to him, "Teacher, order your disciples to stop." He answered, "I tell you, if these were silent, the stones would shout out."

Deacon: The Gospel of the Lord.

People: Praise to you, Lord Christ.

BLESSING OF THE PALMS

Presider: The Lord be with you.

People: And also with you.

Presider: Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

People: It is right to give God thanks and praise.

It is right to praise you, Almighty God, for the acts of love by which you have redeemed us through your Son Jesus Christ our Lord. On this day he entered the holy city of Jerusalem in triumph, and was proclaimed as King of kings by those who spread their garments and branches of palm along his way. Let these branches be for us signs of his victory, and grant that we who bear them in his name may ever hail him as our King, and follow him in the way that leads to eternal life; who lives and reigns in glory with you and the Holy Spirit, now and for ever. Amen.

The palms are distributed.

Presider: Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord.

People: Hosanna in the highest.

THE PROCESSION

Deacon: Let us go forth in peace.

People: In the name of Christ. Amen.

MUSIC AT THE PROCESSION Highland Cathedral Roever/Korb, arr. Maynard

The procession moves down the aisle, out the main doors, and around the church. [In inclement weather, the procession is made around the Nave.] Order of procession: thurifer, crucifer, bagpipes, choir, congregation, altar party. You may remain seated in the Nave. When all have returned to the church, the people remain standing for the following hymn:

Presider: The Lord be with you.

People: And also with you.

Almighty and everliving God, in your tender love for the human race you sent your Son our Savior Jesus Christ to take upon him our nature, and to suffer death upon the cross, giving us the example of his great humility: Mercifully grant that we may walk in the way of his suffering, and also share in his resurrection; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. **Amen.**

All are seated.

THE FIRST LESSON

ISAIAH 50:4-9a

The Lord GOD has given me the tongue of a teacher, that I may know how to sustain the weary with a word. Morning by morning he wakens—wakens my ear to listen as those who are taught. The Lord GOD has opened my ear, and I was not rebellious, I did not turn backward. I gave my back to those who struck me, and my cheeks to those who pulled out the beard; I did not hide my face from insult and spitting. The Lord GOD helps me; therefore I have not been disgraced; therefore I have set my face like flint, and I know that I shall not be put to shame; he who vindicates me is near. Who will contend with me? Let us stand up together. Who are my adversaries? Let them confront me. It is the Lord GOD who helps me; who will declare me guilty?

Reader: The Word of the Lord.

People: Thanks be to God.

PSALM 31:9-16 (*sung by the Choir; the People respond with the Antiphon*)

Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus, who, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God as something to be exploited, but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness. And being found in human form, he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death—even death on a cross. Therefore God also highly exalted him and gave him the name that is above every name, so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bend, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

Reader: The Word of the Lord.

People: **Thanks be to God.**

All stand.

THE PASSION OF OUR LORD JESUS CHRIST ACCORDING TO LUKE

The Passion Gospel is read by members of the congregation. Please see the booklet and join in saying the parts in bold. The people remain seated until the arrival at Golgotha, and then all stand. At the end of the Gospel, all remain standing for a period of silence and the Prayers of the People.

PRAYERS OF THE PEOPLE

Deacon

We pray for all that you have created and named good, especially the land, sea, sky, and life surrounding us, that it may be cherished in the present and preserved for the future. Lord, have mercy; **Christ, have mercy.**

We pray that our nation will continue the turning necessary to resolve its sinful legacy of slavery and racism. We pray especially for the continuing season of racial healing, justice, and reconciliation, that it may open eyes, hearts, and minds throughout the Episcopal Church in Connecticut. Lord, have mercy; **Christ, have mercy.**

We pray for St. Thomas's Church and Day School, that we may help one another to cultivate our unique gifts for making this a better world. During this period of Lenten preparation, we pray especially for our inquirers: Greg, Jesse, Joann, and Bob. Lord, have mercy; **Christ, have mercy.**

We pray for the children and youth of this and every community, that they may know love and safety, and grow in wisdom and kindness. Lord, have mercy; **Christ, have mercy.**

We pray for all who suffer in body, mind, or spirit, that they may find solace, strength, and healing. Lord, have mercy; **Christ, have mercy.**

We pray for all who have died, that they may join the saints in your eternal glory. Lord, have mercy; **Christ, have mercy.**

We pray for the intercessions and thanksgivings that we now name before you, either silently or aloud.

Presider

O God of all creation, hear the prayers of your people: lead us from the wilderness of earthly trials into the garden of your heavenly kingdom, where we will no longer hunger or thirst, but be filled with your life forever; through Jesus Christ our savior. **Amen.**

THE PEACE

Presider: The peace of the Lord be always with you.

People: **And also with you.**

*The People greet one another with a sign of peace, and then are seated for brief announcements. After the announcements, the People remain seated for the **Offertory Anthem**, during which the collection is taken. The Ushers then carry the gifts forward and the altar is prepared. **During the season of Lent, rather than gathering around the altar, the People remain in the pews for the Eucharistic prayer.***
